Dr. Todd Golub is a leading cancer researcher and founding member of the Broad Institute of Harvard and MIT, a unique partnership of Harvard, MIT, and the Harvard teaching hospitals that uses cross-disciplinary collaboration to meet the most critical challenges in biology and medicine. Golub also serves as the Charles Dana Investigator at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and a Professor of Pediatrics at Harvard Medical School. He has won numerous awards and international recognition from peers for his scientific contributions, which focus on bringing the Human Genome Project to bear on the diagnosis and treatment of cancer. Golub is credited with the discovery of a common cause of childhood leukemia, the development of new approaches to molecular classification of cancer, and the development of novel approaches to cancer drug discovery. He was elected to the Board of Directors of the American Association for Cancer Research and was appointed to the National Cancer Institute's Board of Scientific Counselors. Golub received a bachelor's degree from Carleton College and his M.D. from the University of Chicago Pritzker School of Medicine. At New Trier, Golub was involved in the performing arts as a crew member and member of the Board for Lagniappe, New Trier's annual student-written and produced variety show.
